Safety Officer's Report



Here we are on the downhill side of 2008. It's been a good year, so far. I am not aware of any serious mishaps, which can only mean that my superior skills as the club's Safety Coordinator have exceeded expectations! Just kidding, I can't really take credit for our club not having any accidents. It is the club as a whole - collectively we keep each other aware of our surroundings (Situational Awareness). Think about it, when someone goes out to start a plane we almost always have someone step up and assist or ask if they would like some help. In a way we are all on the same team, and our team works well together.

Our flying season is winding down, the days are getting shorter and the available flying weekends will be fewer as well. This will be a great time to check out our airplanes to make sure they are still in good order. We, as modelers, have an obligation to each other to make sure that our toys are safe to operate. A little preventative maintenance will provide an opportunity to inspect your equipment to ensure it is still safe to operate.

Safe work habits also apply to our work areas. Does your work area have adequate lighting? How about

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good ventilation? Flammable liquids stored properly? What about those sharp pointy blades, do you have a place to dispose of old blades? A dull blade can still slice open skin and remember, never, ever, try to catch a hobby knife if it falls off the table. You might want to move your feet though, wouldn't you rather have to change a blade that struck the floor than pull a knife out of your foot? The same applies to a rotary tool - if it slips or falls, catching it may not be a good idea, especially if it is running! Now you have to wonder how I know about these scenarios... You should also have a way to debond yourself from your model if the CA seeps through the wood and grabs your skin. The debonder is a safer way to un-gluue yourself. Using a really sharp instrument has the potential to add insult to injury. Do you have a fire extinguisher handy? Why would I need a fire extinguisher? Don't ask.

Be safe. Think about what you are doing while you're doing it. Ask yourself what would happen if the knife blade or screwdriver slips. Like I have said all year long, don't hurt yourself while having fun. You cannot protect other people from themselves, but you do have the ability to protect yourself, so be safe - at home, at work, when traveling, when flying, when you do whatever, try to do it safely. If not for yourself, then do it for those that depend on you.

Thanks to everyone for having another safe flying season with The Temple Aero Modelers.

Update on Alex Divine

Editor's note: Former club member Alex Divine sent the following update on his flight training status. Alex learned to fly RC models at our club (along with his Grandfather, James McKee) while attending school here in Temple, before going off to the Air Force Academy.

Hi Y'all, and Greetings from beautiful(?) Wichita Falls. I'm sure my granddad James has kept you all up to date on my training, but I thought I'd send you a few words.

I graduated from pilot training last December (2007) and got my 2nd pick assignment: F-16 Fighting Falcons

at Luke AFB (Phoenix, AZ). Originally I was supposed to be out there by Summer '08 but with the tragic accidents here and at other training bases the plans got postponed. I finally started IFF (Introduction to Fighter Fundamentals) in September.



It sure is amazing to see all those acrobatic maneuvers I practiced with the RC planes being put to good use! As you may or may not know, IFF is a graduate pilot program intended to introduce basic fighter maneuvers (BFM) and basic surface attack (SA) tasks.

While it's a far cry from full-up dogfighting, the (relatively) limited performance of the T-38C actually makes you learn the correct procedures, since it bleeds energy in nearly every maneuver (it's REALLY important to select the correct one!) I've completed the Offensive portion, which is where the student begins with an advantage, and have finished 2 of my 4 Defensive rides. Defense is uncomfortable not only because you have the IP's (simulated) bullets being fired at you, but also because they're asking you to max perform the jet while looking behind you. I finally found out what they mean when they say it's like having an elephant sitting on your chest!

Anyway, just thought I'd let you know how things are going and if you're in Wichita Falls before Christmas or Phoenix after February let me know and I'll take you out on the flight line.

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Leading a Club is More Than Doing the Job Yourself

The year 2008 is winding down and this is the time when many of our clubs elect new, or reelect current, officers for the coming year. I'm going to begin this column by shamelessly plagiarizing an article I recently read about being an association officer: "Filling an officer role does not mean that you are required to do the job alone. Being an officer simply means that you are responsible for ensuring that the job gets done. As an officer, you are allowed to ask other members of the club to help you fulfill your duties."

How true is that? I've been a member of a number of different organizations, and far too often I've seen cases of burnout because club officers feel a need to carry the load of running a club or association entirely on their own shoulders.

Sure, there's a responsibility that goes along with being a club officer, but that responsibility doesn't include doing all of the work yourself. In fact, over time, many clubs eventually fail because the club officers allow themselves to be put in a position where they had to do all of the work and simply accepted this as the way things were done. In other words, it was easier to do the job yourself than to solicit the help of others. At least that sounded good at the time.

As club members we should accept the fact that we all need to play some part—even if only a small part—to ensure the well-being of our club. That's what being part of a club is supposed to be all about. At the same time we recognize that those who have volunteered their time to be club leaders have accepted a greater level of responsibility; however, that responsibility should lean more toward creating an atmosphere of teamwork and cooperation within your club.

As a club officer you also have an opportunity to influence the direction of, and culture within, your club. Your members depend on you, as well as the other elected officers, to help set and meet goals and objectives for your club during your term. How you do that can mean the difference between success and failure, not only for you, but for your club.

In some cases, if things go extremely wrong, it can result in an officer eventually leaving not only the club, but modeling all together, because the pressures of

holding a club office have taken the fun out of what was supposed to be an enjoyable activity.

Please keep all of this in mind as we move into the new year. Being a club officer doesn't mean tackling every project or activity yourself. It doesn't have to feel like a job. Most often, it can be an enjoyable experience if approached the right way. Enlist your members to do their part in support of your club. Most want to be a part. They just need to be asked.

Since this is the last issue of the *AMA Insider* for 2008 I want to close this month by wishing everyone a happy holiday season and the best of luck in the coming year.


